This year, the history portion of the tour will discuss the ancient & modern history of the Ranch as well as plans for the future to include even more opportunities for visitors to enjoy the

ecology & environment.
In particular, we are
expanding our survey of
the Ranch to further clarify
archaeological sites which

will help us to determine the impact of ancient peoples who lived here.

In the last 60 days we have identified two additional intensely used areas where extensive pottery sherds are readily visible. It is very exciting knowing there are many undisturbed sites on the Ranch adding momentum to our mission

of Preservation, Conservation and Education.

The Ranch boasts **5** Seasons!

Winter brings occasional snow and crisp clear skies. During

Early Spring the wildflowers & grasses begin peeking out.

Mesquites & manzanitas come alive. Our ponds are abuzz with

happy birds, dragonflies & Koi. Late April & May bring the most birds. Check the "Watch the Birdies" page on our web site for a list of our sightings. This early Spring green-up often recedes into a dry period until the much anticipated monsoons begin. This is known as the fifth or Spring Dry Season. Although we don't see much rain during this time, the birdlife, nesting &

newborn wildlife is abundant.

Summer shows off tall green grasses and the bluest skies in Arizona. Since we are at 4848 feet, temperatures are 10-15 degrees cooler than Tucson or Phoenix. Many years have not seen 100° and the maximum only 101-103°. Fall begins with cooler temps changing colors & evolves into the best weather in the entire country!

HISTORICAL TIMELINE

10,000 BC~ Wetter, warmer climate. Giant mammals. Folsom Point. Hunter Culture

5,000 BC~ Colder, dryer climate. Smaller animals. Hunter/Gatherer Culture

200 AD~ Archaic Hunter/Gatherer Culture

800 AD to 1240 AD~ Archaic Culture becomes more organized. Pueblo Period begins. Mogollon, Hohokam, Mimbres

1240 AD~ Dramatic climate change. Drought. Natural resources over-utilized

1250 AD~ Mesa Verde (Colorado) ~ abandoned

1260 AD~ All Mogollon (New Mexico) sites abandoned Casas Grandes (Mexico) site abandoned

1299 AD~ Kayenta sites (Arizona) abandoned All peoples widely scattered throughout regions

1300 AD~ Apaches have filtered into the Southwest & are widely scattered

1540 AD~ Coronado & Spanish explore Southwest "Despoblado"

Between 1805 & 1815~ Cochise born - Chokonen Band - Chiricahua Apache

1786 - 1831 generally peaceful

1810 - 1821 Mexican War of Independence
 Apaches return to raiding

1846~ U.S. / Mexican War begins

1851~ New U.S. border ~ Colorado, Utah & Arizona annexed into the U.S. Raiding increases ~ beginning of 35 year Apache Wars

1861 ~ 1872~ Cochise War begins - Bascom Affair • 1861 - 1865 Civil War

1872~ Cochise achieves Peace Treaty

1874~ Cochise dies, is buried somewhere in the Stronghold

1876~ Reservation closed. Geronimo War begins

1884~ John Rockfellow starts horse ranch

1886~ Geronimo surrenders. Deported to Florida

1894~ Martin Costello establishes Cochise Stronghold Ranch

2005~ Ranch acquired from Costello Estate

2013~ Wings Over Willcox guests visit the Ranch
